

LAST WILL AND TESTAMENT OF JOHN GLENNAN

8830 - 12th September 1883 This day by Act of Court, Letters of Administration of the Estate and effects of John Glennan late of Cooma Creek, Grazier, deceased were granted to Joseph Glennan one of the Legatees in said will. Named Testator died 25th April, 1883. Estate sworn at £598, Cooma Creek, January 12, 1878.

I, John Glennan have this day made my will in my calm and rational senses. I bequeath to my son Joseph Glennan all that piece of land area 31 acres, date of purchase 17th August, 1858 Parish of Cooma, County Beresford (1) 58/2251. Also I bequeath to the aforesaid Joseph Glennan all of land containing 33 acres as lot G.G. at Cooma Creek, County Beresford, Parish Cooma date of purchase 21st April, 1864. I also bequeath to Joseph Glennan one plough and one harrow. I also bequeath to my daughter, Mrs. Kelly all that parcel or piece of land containing 40 acres conditionally purchased by Joseph Glennan at Cooma on 21st June 1866. I also bequeath to her that piece of land containing 47 acres conditionally purchased by Joseph Glennan at Cooma on 11th September, 1862. I also bequeath to her that piece containing 40 acres conditionally purchased by John Glennan on 20th April, 1871. Also I bequeath to her 60 acres conditionally purchased by Joseph Glennan at Cooma on 22nd April, 1867. I also bequeath to her all that piece of land containing 60 acres conditionally purchased by John Glennan Snr. at Cooma on 8th December, 1870 and all my sheep and cattle to be equally divided between my three daughters Mary Ann, Bridget and Rose and my son, Laurence also my Bullock Dray and tackling to my daughter Mrs. Kelly. All the aforesaid being my last will and testimony. My wish is that this will be opened 14 days after my death by those whom I appoint, Andrew Butler and James Devereaux Jnr.

P.S. My cattle are branded 26 sheep branded 'the same' is on back - signed by me this day of our lord 1878 - John Glennan his X mark, witness Andrew Butler and James Devereaux Jnr.
